If your child has been talking about filling buckets or has come home wearing a bucket sticker, you may have wondered what on earth is going on in school! Each class has looked at the book 'Have You Filled a Bucket Today?' By Carol Have You Filled a Bucket Today? McCloud. Through simple prose and vivid illustrations, the book encourages positive behaviour by using the concept of an invisible bucket to show children how easy and rewarding it is to express kindness and appreciation by 'filling buckets'. Bucket filling and dipping are effective metaphors for understanding the effects of our actions and words on the well-being of others and ourselves. Even the youngest children have been able to engage in the concept and are proud to be bucket fillers. We are proud of them too!

Sizzling Science in Year Six!

This week, Year 6 have been investigating the differences between reversible and irreversible changes. We looked at different materials, predicted whether we thought, when heated and then cooled, the reactions to the materials would be reversible or irreversible and observed the changes that happened.

We found out that a reversible reaction is when a material, when heated, changes states and when cooled will change back again. It is an irreversible change when a material does not change back to the same state as it did before it was heated. Because we used a flame in our experiment, we had to ensure that we worked well together to maintain a safe environment.
