Dear Parents and Carers,

As I write this we have begun our next lockdown, but I am optimistic that we are far more ready for it than last time! We have plans in place if we need to close and have a clear remote offer, but I am delighted that the government have seen the importance of continuing education for children and that schools are remaining open. However, we all, as a school community, need to take every precaution to help keep one another safe. We are continuing to keep rooms well ventilated and are doing all we can to keep socially distanced from one another and have ensured hand hygiene is of the upmost importance. We do have a number of people within our community who are more vulnerable, and for that reason staff are going to now be wearing masks in corridors, where they can not maintain social distancing. They will not be wearing them when they are within their year group bubble. You will have seen they are also wearing visors/masks at drop off and pick up times. You will appreciate I have a duty of care for all of the school community, children and adults ,and we ,as a school, have to put everyone's safety first. This is in line with the government guidance that states that for Primary schools, "In situations where social distancing between adults in settings is not possible (e.g. when moving around in corridors and communal areas), settings have the discretion to recommend the use of face coverings for adults on site, for both staff and visitors.".

The staff had an excellent learning day for our INSET day just before half term. We have made some considerable improvements to our IT systems so that we are now able to utilise the O365 suite of resources. During our training, we have learnt how to utilise some of these to enhance our remote offer. Staff have become accustomed to the extensive opportunities of Teams. All classes are now a "Team" and we will be writing to you about this in more detail early next week. We will be gradually moving our remote offer from our website onto Teams, in the weeks ahead. As you can appreciate this has been a huge learning curve for staff, and I am very grateful to Mrs McLeod for her enthusiasm and expertise in supporting and leading staff in this initiative.

For collective worship this half term, we are continuing our theme of 'Count your Blessings' and are particularly exploring our school values of Hope, Compassion and Trust. This week the children have reflected upon school life and how all of our values resonate here. I have attached some of these reflections in this newsletter. Please do have a read.

Many of the classes have had inspiration days this week, to launch their learning for this half term—again there are some articles overleaf that capture the fun they have had.

We had our first ever Virtual Open Morning this week for prospective Reception parents (Intake in September 2021). The next one is next Wednesday at 7pm. Please do pass the word to friends and neighbours who are at that stage of their children's learning. But do go on the website to watch our virtual tour. It is absolutely lovely and really captures the essence of St Paul's. Our Year 6 did a great job narrating and thank you to Robert Glass who put it together. It is well worth a watch.

Black History Month



October was Black History Month and in the week before half term each class studied an important historical figure. Reception studied Mae Jemison and then produced a really lovely rocket to show how she was important in space travel.

Year 1 studied Rosa Parks and produced a piece of work expressing how she felt. Year 2 looked at the importance of Mary Seacole while Year 3 came more into the present day and explored the amazing



poetry of Benjamin Zephaniah. Year 4 looked at the inventor of the traffic lights (Garett

Morgan) and Year 5 explored famous Black sports personalities. Finally, year 6 studied Martin Luther King and produced posters showing why he was important in helping making everyone more equal. All the school also looked at the speech by Martin Luther King and created their own short dream speeches. One example from year 6: 'I have a dream that men, women and people of all nations can all live



equally and be treated with fairness. I have a dream that pollution will not exist and



humans will live in harmony with wildlife and that every creature will be treated with kindness.' Finally this week all the school have completed a Black History treasure hunt to enable them to understand the significant contribution people of different race and culture have in the world of sport, literature, science and politics.

to everyone who took part in these competitions. It was great to see so many smiles!


Happy Shoes Day





