YEAR 5 Science & Music Adventure at The Priory School


On Monday 24th June, Year 5 yomped over in the sunshine to the beautiful Priory School campus to experience what Music and Science are like at a Secondary School. We began our morning in the Music studio (or in the Science labs for Cedar) where we were treated to a fantastic rendition of Wimoweh; The Lion Sleeps Tonight from The Lion King, played on the steel drums by some incredibly talented Year 8 pupils. The music teacher then told us that by the end of the morning we would also be playing that same song! We must admit that we were a little sceptical, but game for a music adventure. We started out by learning the rhythm on the djembe drums and then added the singing parts. The year 9s then showed some of us how to play the melody and the bass on the steel drums. We stopped for a break for a drink and a biscuit in the school restaurant before moving onto our next activity.

Lunch smelled amazing but we, unfortunately, were not staying for that, maybe next time?

We were then off to work with the Science teachers (and Cedar to experience the Music teaching) in the fantastic, purpose built labs, where we explored how fireworks were made and what gives them their brilliant colours. We donned our protective eyewear, very fetching, and carefully lit our Bunsen burners before heating a variety of different metals to find out what colours they created when exposed to heat and flame. It was an wonderful experience to be able to use the equipment and resources of a proper lab for our experiments – we felt like real scientists!

Both classes then joined together to perform Wimoweh all together. It was truly magical.

We really enjoyed our morning and were so impressed with the incredible facilities and welcoming and friendly teachers and children - they made our morning a really enjoyable experience.
