What Can You Remember?



What is the source?

The source is the place where a river starts.

What is the mouth?

The mouth is where a river flows into the sea.

Where do most rivers start?

Most rivers start in high ground or in the mountains.

Do all rivers flow directly into the sea?

No — some flow into other rivers or into lake.



Joining Together

Many rivers join up with the River Thames. They are called tributaries.
