Dear Parents and Carers,

Well, the half-term break is virtually upon us and we have come to the end of another successful half term. The children have certainly engaged in some very inspiring learning—I have just noticed the Year 5s having their photos taken with their DT project; a cams mechanism that depicts the solar system! They look very impressive and I can assure you that if you donated shoe boxes they have been put to extremely good use!

We gathered today for our half termly service this morning—sadly, it was just too wet to walk to the Church so Rev Alex kindly came to us. The service was centred around Candlemas and the courage that Simeon and Anna showed in their wait to see Jesus. The children read and sang beautifully and it was very special to gather as a whole school community before we have our break. Due to the service, we did not have Star of the Week this week, but we did celebrate the children who have been awarded their bronze, silver or gold book reading awards. If you recall, if children have read 10,000 words (in books that they have guizzed about) they win bronze, 500,000 words awards them a silver badge and 1,000,000 words read awards them a gold badge. Very well done to those children who have won these awards! If you are unsure how your child can complete a quiz following the completion of a book, please do speak to their class teacher.
