<u>Task two:</u> Log onto Phonics Play. When you have logged on click on **INTERACTIVE RESOURCES-PHASE 5.** Scroll down to Phase 5C interactive resources.

Click on investigating alternative spellings/ai/

Click on phoneme spotter and read through: The great snail race.

How many different graphemes can you find for the /ai/ phoneme?

Write them down in your workbook. Then click on reveal graphemes to see how many you have got correct.

Click on word sort.

Sort the words by the way they are spelt. Once you have completed this click on the bottom right hand button that says 'The best bet.'


