


What are rainforests?


Rainforests are very dense, warm, wet forests. They are habitats for millions of plants and animals.

It is estimated that about half of all the earth's plant and animal life lives in rainforests.

Rainforests are extremely important in the ecology of the Earth. The plants of the rainforest generate much of the Earth's oxygen.

Where Is the Daintree Rainforest?

The Daintree Rainforest is north of Cairns, in the far north of Queensland, Australia.



How Big is the Daintree Rainforest?

The Daintree Rainforest is home to the largest amount of plants and animals on earth. It is about 1200 square kilometres.

The Southern Cassowary

The southern cassowary eats fallen fruits, including many types which are poisonous to humans. The bottom claw on each foot is very long and sharp. The birds will strike out with these when they are defending their home, or if they are defending themselves from other animals or humans.



Tree Kangaroos

Tree-kangaroos have adapted to spend their lives in the trees of the Daintree Rainforest. Tree-kangaroos are not nocturnal, but are cathemeral, which means they are active for short amounts of time both in the day or at night. After too much activity they will have a nap!

Double Eyed Fig Parrot

Australia's smallest parrot eats almost entirely figs.

Boyds Forest Dragon

They have a body temperature lower than any other rainforest lizard in this area so that they are not seen by pythons (pythons can see warmblooded prey more easily).

Indigenous Australians and The Daintree Rainforest

This area is owned by the eastern Kuku Yalanji Aboriginal people.

Lots of different plants and animals provided food for the eastern Kuku Yalanji people.

The eastern Kuku Yalanji people understand the weather and its effects on plants, and this makes it easier for them to find a variety of food throughout the year. Many of the animals that live in trees were also hunted including tree-kangaroos, possums and flying foxes.
